Times and Colours

May is now upon us and hopefully the weather has improved! Over the month of May a lot is packed in from a Church of England perspective. Forty days after Easter we have Ascension Day, this year on the 9th of May. It is the last day that the disciples saw Jesus before he ascended into heaven after promising the disciples that they would receive power from the Holy Spirit.

Then we will celebrate Pentecost on Sunday 19th May. The wondrous day when the Holy Spirit came to the disciples. The house they were in was filled with sound, like the rush of a violent wind, filling the entire house and a tongue of fire rested on each disciple and they were filled with the Holy Spirit and were given the gift of speaking different languages. They were able to talk to all, no matter what nation they came from, about the Good News, that was Jesus.

Then, on Sunday 26th May we celebrate Trinity Sunday. The sermon that priests often don't want to write because the Trinity is so much about our faith, what we believe, that it's difficult to put into words. We say in our creed that we believe in God the Father, God the Son and God the Holy Spirit, but to explain it is difficult.

And then June arrives and apart from some Saints' days we are in ordinary time. The colour for vestments is green going through to Advent; the white and purple of Lent and Easter gone for quite a while.

The word 'ordinary' comes from the word ordinal which means 'counted'. Each week is known by a number, e.g. Proper 4 being the Sunday after Trinity Sunday. The use of the term Ordinary Time

distinguishes it from the other seasons - Advent, Christmas, Lent and Easter - which focus on particular aspects of the life of Jesus: his birth, suffering, death and resurrection.

But what does ordinary time mean for us? It sounds boring, nothing special. But I feel it is a time when the pressure is off. Our diaries aren't full of extra services. It's a time when we can concentrate on the bible in a peaceful, calm way.

Ordinary Time celebrates Jesus' teaching and ministry. It gives us opportunity to reflect on how we live as Christians, to look at and 'order' our lives while we read and reflect on one of the Gospels. The Church has a three-year cycle for focussing on a particular Gospel so that we can enter it more deeply. This year is year B – The Gospel of Mark. Mark is a good gospel to get to grips with. Not too long, vibrant and full of pace. But it still says an awful lot.

Ordinary Time, as I said, is when we wear green. Think of all the green around us at this time of year. All the trees are clothed in their late spring/early summer clothes. New life has sprung from the earth, and it is vibrant and green. The allotments are coming to life, full of green leaves, beans climbing up canes, green shoots being nurtured by dedicated gardeners – or feeding the wildlife!

The Cambridge Dictionary's definition of the word ordinary is 'not different or special or unexpected in any way'. Ordinary can make us feel safe. It can give us comfort, give peace and healing.

I ask you to really invest time during this ordinary period to the reading of St. Mark's Gospel. Read the passages not associated with the 'special' events in Jesus' life but His ordinary time, which was always extraordinary. God Bless,

- Student Work OMF workers partner with national student organisations to share the good news of Jesus.
- Theological education OMF serves the Church in East Asia by helping to train future leaders for pastoring churches.

Christian Aid exists to create a world where everyone can live a full life, free from poverty. This involves working in partnership with local organisations, as well as with governments and the private sector.

Thank you to everyone who came along to the Pot-Luck lunch recently. The lunch, which was hot, took place to kick start our campaign for Christian Aid and raised over £500 when gift aid was factored in. Parish Pilgrimage to St Julian of Norwich

"He did not say, 'You shall not be perturbed, you shall not be troubled, you shall not be distressed', but he said, 'You shall not be overcome.' "

On Saturday 9th March several of us travelled to Norwich to visit St Julian's church and shrine. We had learnt about St Julian and her visions during the Lent course so a visit to the place where she experienced her visions over 650 years ago seemed appropriate. It was a cold sunny day and the warm welcome from the team at the reception was very welcome. Excellent tea and biscuits were much appreciated by all.

After refreshments we went into the Church where Revd. Richard Stanton gave us an insightful presentation about Julian of Norwich's life, her impact then and now, and how we are only beginning to really appreciate the meaning of her 'shewings'. It was a truly inspiring talk and testament to his presentation was that the coldness of the chapel was soon forgotten!





Though St Julian's Church was badly damaged during WWII bombing, generous donors from around the world made a post-war reconstruction possible, during which time the foundations of Julian's Cell was uncovered - having been destroyed some centuries earlier. We were able to enter the cell, which contains a small chapel for reflection and

private prayer. Sitting in her calm, but basic living quarters, was a special moment.



As well as the shrine church, there is the adjoining churchyard garden, a spacious green area well suited for picnics, quiet reflection, or a breath of fresh air. A delightfully peaceful place in the centre of a busy city.

We also had a wonderful time visiting the lovely city of Norwich. Some of us even met the London pilgrims at Evening Prayer in the Cathedral that day! I got chatting to some of them as we walked very fast (ran!) to the station. How wonderful that Julian and our faith can create fellowship amongst friends and strangers.

As St Leonard's approached Holy Week, the Lent group reflected on our study theme of Witnessing the Cross. There is no doubt, our pilgrimage has enriched the experienced and helped us move ever closer to Christ and the meaning of Easter.



From the Archives

In our last magazine we looked at the Vestry Minutes up to 1819, in this edition we turn our attention to the events of April, May 1820. To say the least they are tumultuous as the decision is made to demolish a medieval church and replace it with the church we now use. The driving force for the new building is the Revd Preston.

Vestry Meeting 26th April 1820

The Revd G. Preston chaired the meeting. The following was resolved:

- 1. That the present church having been for some time past extremely inconvenient and much too small for the accommodation of the greatly increased population of the parish and the walls, roof and foundation thereof having also having been found on examination by two competent surveyors to be much decayed and in an unsafe condition, the same to be taken down and rebuilt on a larger scale according to a plan and estimate now submitted to the meeting by the chairman.
- 2. The chairman stated he had received funds to carry out the plan. Amounting to £880 in subscriptions plus £200 from the Church Building Society. It was decided that the Churchwardens could borrow the further sum of £1000 for completing the new church. This to paid off by an annual church rate.
- 3. That the Churchwardens to apply to Mr. M. G. Thompson, Architect of Dedham, who furnished the said plan and estimate for a specification of the same and that Messer Hayward and son Carpenters and Mr. J. Nelson Bricklayer, all of this Parish, do send in tenders agreeably thereto.

The events of the meeting of the 26th would appear to be already decided. That Revd Preston had obtained the basic finances to carry out the demolition of the medieval church having obtained a surveyor's report saying the old church was

dilapidated and dangerous. Also, Revd Preston submitted the plans and estimate for the new church.

Vestry Meeting 24th May

Tender from Henry Hayward Jnr (Carpenter & Builder) on behalf of himself and James Nelson (Bricklayer) to build the church as planned £2200. The Society for promoting the enlargement and building of Churches and Chapels made a grant of £500

As stated in the last magazine Henry Hayward Junior was the son of the Churchwarden but it seems they were in business together.

In 2001 the Colchester Archaeological Trust had a watching brief as Anglian Water worked on the water supply in Spring Lane. The CAT Report 160 section 3.5 states that the remains of the Medieval church were still visible in the 1950's. In an Article in the Essex Archaeological and History Paper volume 24 (1993) J. Horace Round makes the following observation when quoting from Mr. Halwell Phillips stating that it was the practise in pre and the early Victorian era for objects that would now be highly valued, were thought old fashioned and unworthy of an enlightened age were swept away. George Round Esq. who donated money for the destruction of the medieval church was the ancestor of J Horace Round.

APCM - SUNDAY 28TH APRIL 2024

The APCM took place on Sunday 28th April and was attended by 21 members of the congregation. The meeting was chaired by Nick Allston (Churchwarden). The following is a summary of the outcome of the meeting.

- 1. Election of Churchwardens. David Watkins and Nick Allston were unanimously elected as our Churchwardens for another year.
- 2. The Annual Report on the proceedings of the PCC and the activities of the Parish in general, and the Financial Statement had been made available previously to the congregation. There were no matters arising from either report and both were approved.
- 3. The Financial Statement. Adrian reported on the annual financial statement and was available to take questions. He reported that income was up on the previous year; very successful fund-raising events were held. The tax recovered from gift aided donations continues to be significant. Thanks must go to our outgoing stewardship recorder, Tom Scrimgeour and his successor Andrew Lennard-Jones. However, as in previous years, our expenditure did not meet our income and therefore the accounts for 2023 show a negative balance. Thanks were expressed to Adrian and the Treasury Team.
- 4. Election of Representatives of the Laity to the Deanery Synod - no new members were elected, Maureen Watkins, Julie Hinchcliffe, and Linda Firth continue as our representatives.

APCM - SUNDAY 28TH APRIL 2024

- 5. Election of Representatives of the Laity to the Parochial Church Council three nominations were received for Yvonne Romain, David Burrows and Deirdre Fordham. All 3 were duly elected.




