Honouring the gift of children and the vulnerable among us

The presence among us of children, the vulnerable, the outcast, and of newcomers is one of the greatest gifts of God. The teaching and ministry of Jesus makes this abundantly clear. But to cherish this gift properly is to accept a great deal of responsibility and to act upon it. We know and practice this in the contemporary world using the word, 'safeguarding.'

The letters of Paul and other apostles demonstrate that Christian communities have been trying to honour this gift by practising forms of safeguarding for as long as there has been a Church. Paul's teaching (and clear expectation!) is that the weaker members of any Church community should receive the greatest honour – not mere protection, but the greatest honour. When we read the New Testament in greater depth, however, we also see the great failures and problems in this regard within the early Church.

Less frequently spoken of explicitly are the dangers and temptations that come with our responsibilities in communities and the church: abuse of our power over others, complacency, and self-preservation at others' cost. But in God's Kingdom Jesus showed that there is no room for blind deference to human power, no room for human ego nor complacency, and no room for abusive or negligent relationships.

Like every human institution, the Church has often fallen foul of these things. This is always an immense tragedy in the Church, however, because - although we acknowledge that each of us is a sinner and falls short of the standards of God - the Church must strive with all its

energy and determination to be the living embodiment of God's salvation for all in the world.

Given this gift, this responsibility, and these tragic failings, I was very pleased to learn of a new initiative called Safe Spaces. It can be very difficult to speak of abuse and suffering within the church. But Safe Spaces is a free and independent support service, providing a confidential, personal, and safe space for anyone who has been abused by someone in the Church or as a result of their relationship with the Church of England, the Catholic Church in England and Wales or the Church in Wales. Those who would benefit from this service can make contact via their website https://safespacesenglandandwales.org.uk/ or by telephone on 0300 303 1056 (Mon-Fri 9.00-21.00, Saturdays 9.00-13.00, Sundays 13.00-17.00).

Here at St Leonard's, we remain committed to continue our hard work in maintaining a culture that takes safeguarding seriously. Alternatively talk to our Parish Safeguarding Officer (PSO), Julie Hinchcliffe (safeguarding@stleonardslexden.org.uk, other contact details can be found later in this magazine) or her deputy Amanda Allston.

If you have any safeguarding concerns, please act with urgency, and speak with our PSO or deputy – or me, of course, once I am back at work full time. I am grateful to all of you, and especially to Julie and Amanda, for St Leonard's extraordinary efforts in helping us cherish the gift of children, the vulnerable and outcast, and newcomers among us. May we never be complacent in honouring this central part of the Gospel.

A Rather Unusual Blessing

On Sunday 11th August I performed a rather unusual blessing.

The young man in the picture is Brett, who comes from New Zealand and has Māori ancestry. He has lived in the UK for 15 years and recently he and his fiancee, Vicky, returned to New Zealand to get married.

As tradition has it, Brett's father passed on to him a beautiful piece of pounamu to celebrate this important event in Brett's life. The pounamu has to pass through running fresh water in its country of origin and be blessed before being given to the recipient. The same ceremony is repeated in the country where the pounamu ends up.

As the water ran out of the ewer into the font I blessed the water and the pounamu and said a special prayer to bless the marriage of Brett and Vicky.

It was wonderful to think about the importance of sharing differing kinds of spirituality; just feeling the beauty of the stone, which goes back thousands of years, was amazing.

Pounamu is a term for several types of hard and durable stone found in the South Island of New Zealand. They are highly valued in New Zealand, and carvings made from pounamu play an important role in Māori culture. Pounamu taonga increase in mana (spiritual power or prestige) as they pass from one generation to another. Pounamu is believed to absorb the mana of its past owners, and some heirloom pieces are named after a former owner in memory of their position and authority. The most prized taonga are those with known histories going back many generations: these are believed to have their own mana and are often given as gifts to seal important events in someone's life.



MOUSE TAILS

After all the excitement of the Church Fete, most of the mice families returned to their usual homes, including the Woods families. Mum was, as always, happy to return to their cosy balcony nest, her son and his young family were back in their below the stairs home.

Uncle Bertie had stayed on with the Halls and the families had chance to find out more about his life to date and how he came to arrive at St Leonard's Church. Apparently, he and his grandchildren, little Freddie, and his older sister Molly, had been living at the far end of the Woods. One day they had been forced to scavenge for food further afield. However, a large dog, off the leash, had spotted the little group and bounded up to them to investigate the little creatures and terrified them. The mice had scattered and, once the dog's owner had put on his leash and taken him away, Uncle Bertie started to frantically search for the youngsters, but without success.

During his search he had met up with one of the Woods family (he had decided not to take his family to the Church as his young wife was expecting her first baby and he thought it safer to stay put.) He explained to Uncle Bertie that the rest of his family had gone to the Fete as they did every year to meet up with their cousins, he showed Bertie the way to the underground tunnel and promised to keep an eye open for the missing youngsters. So, this explained why Bertie had arrived at the Church; he had come to ask for their help in finding his grandchildren.

Of course, all the mice living in and around the Church were only too happy to help and tried to comfort Bertie as best they could.

Two days later, two of the Woods family appeared at the Hall and, joy of joys, the two young mice, Freddie and Molly, were with them. Bertie was overjoyed and thanked God and the Woods for returning his family to him. After some discussion he decided to stay and make his home in the Church grounds. Young Freddie was full of it, telling everyone how he had "looked after" Molly as he was the 'man of the family'!



Mrs. Hall made sure that the youngsters were well fed and gave them some cosy bedding materials to start them off. Having done a 'recce' around the grounds Bertie had found what he thought was a nice safe spot underneath the laurel bushes however, had to rethink as gardeners appeared and cut down the lot!



After an extensive search, the trio settled on a spot behind the Hall and in no time at all had a safe, cosy nest not too far away from their new found relatives. Freddie was thrilled to have found lots of young mice to hook up with and was looking forward to new adventures. Molly, a gentle creature, was simply happy to be safe and Bertie was relieved that he had found his long-lost

family and looked forward to joining in with their many activities.

A Pastoral Letter from Bishop Guli following unrest and violence across the UK

8 August 2024

The Bishop of Chelmsford, the Rt Rev Dr Guli Francis-Dehqani has sent the following Pastoral Letter to church leaders across Chelmsford Diocese.

Dear friends,

Just over a week ago, three children were tragically murdered in Southport. That appalling event was then hijacked by extreme right wing groups, sparking anti-immigration attacks and riots nationally which were fuelled by hatred and lies spread on social media. This has left many people feeling fearful and anxious, especially among Muslim communities who have experienced attacks on a number of mosques, but also other groups and individuals of Global Majority Heritage.

There had been threats of further violence in many areas across the country yesterday, including in several places within Chelmsford Diocese. I know that many were extremely fearful. That's why it was all the more heart-warming to see the threats of violence either dissipate or in some cases be subsumed by anti-racism marches. A wonderful outpouring of solidarity for people to demonstrate commitment to a Britain that is peaceful, respectful and generous towards cultural diversity and welcoming to refugees. All this should be a great encouragement to us as we seek to be a force for good in our communities.

I want to express my thanks to those of you in churches across the diocese who have worked closely with the police and other groups in

the past few days. Your involvement and efforts have made a real difference and I'm deeply grateful. In times of national crisis the role of the church should never be underestimated and that has been evident once again.

I hope and pray we will now see an end to the violence and that social media will cease enflaming the situation. I know, however, that a sense of apprehension and uncertainty may well continue for a while. I'm grateful to colleagues on the Bishop's Leadership Team who have been reaching out to churches and individual clergy who may feel especially vulnerable. Please do ask for support if you need it.

None of this takes away the reality that many in this country feel disenfranchised and have grave concerns about the lack of resources for public service. Their voices must be heard and listened to. But violence is never the answer and the spreading of hatred is never to be condoned.

Finally, as people of faith, we continue to share the good news and hope of Jesus Christ in word and action – we do this in season and out of season; we do this in difficult times and in easier times. It's a privilege for me to share in ministry alongside you.

PCC Charities for 2023-24

At the November PCC meeting it was agreed that the following charities should receive our support this year. Each charity will receive a donation of £1000.

- Colchester Foodbank
- Korban (helps homeless young adults in Colchester)
- OMF (overseas mission)
- CYO (Christian Youth Outreach)
- Youth Enquiry Service (Adolescent mental health charity)
- English for Women (Educational charity for female refugees)
- Next Chapter (Women's refuge)
- Colchester Debt Centre (new name for CAP)

I thought it would be helpful to give you a bit of information about each of these charities, this month it is the Youth Enquiry Service (YES).



YES is an award-winning youth charity organisation that has been delivering services for young people across the North-East Essex region for over 30 years. They engage with over 8000 young people per year through the charity's housing, teen pregnancy and mental health counselling services.

<u>Counselling</u> - YES provides a space for young people to speak with a trained professional about their concerns and issues, and to explore their thoughts, feelings and behaviours. YES Counselling is confidential and non-judgmental. <u>Housing</u> – YES works with a variety of young people that are homeless and at risk of becoming homeless. This can include those that are sofa surfing, young people living in a dangerous or abusive environment and those staying in temporary accommodation such as a hostel or night-shelter.

<u>Teen Pregnancy</u> — YES supports young parents with pregnancy health and wellbeing, as well as housing and benefits advice. They also run group sessions, inviting parents to join in with a variety of activities including picnics, arts & crafts and child attachment & development sessions.



From the Archives

Having looked at archives from the 19th century I felt that it was the time to come a little up to date, so we are returning to 1991, 30 plus years ago.

In 1991 an article appeared in the local newspaper concerning the church organ at St Leonard's. Some of our readers may well remember that year as several significant events happened around the world; at the beginning of 1991 Desert Storm started, Mikhail Gorbachev stood down as President of the USSR, the USSR split into separate states and Margaret Thatcher ceased to be Prime Minister.

Regarding St Leonard's, the big issue was the state of the Church Organ which was beginning to show its age. Work had been carried out over the years with changes made in 1921, 1950 and 1970. A report in the local newspaper described the organ as giving out wheezing noises! In 1921 a report in the local paper mentioned the rededication of the restored church organ, taking place on Sunday afternoon with the Rector the Rev. T.S. Raffles conducting the service. It was also reported that the church was well attended. Once the service of rededication was complete Mr. E.H. Turner, the organist from All Saints Church, gave a recital.

The reconstruction was carried out by Messer's Hill and Son and Norman and Beard, following a scheme prepared by Messer's V.E. Marshall, F.J. Motum and E.H. Turner for a cost of £685. During this work it was found that a number of parts dated back to 1823 when the original church organ was installed and the 1921 restoration was to the church organ installed in 1902.

Further restoration and repairs were carried out in 1950 and 1970. This included modifying the pneumatic keyboard to an electrical system and replacing the swell organ and the wind chest. Both these items were second hand due to financial constraints, nothing changes.

A company called Simson and Gentry did the 1991 restoration having carried out a detailed survey of the work required. It was found the sound board was split along its whole length and the workmen also removed five buckets of dust from the pipes in the organ loft. It was quickly realised that many of the problems related to the central heating. A dehumidifier was installed to solve this problem, and the wind chest was increased in size. The keyboard console was renovated, and a new pedal board was fitted.

The church organ contains almost 1000 pipes of various sizes; to raise funds the congregation was asked to sponsor the work on the pipes.

- £10 for the 50 or so 6 metre pipes,
- £5 for the 200 2 metre pipes,
- £3 for the 400 1.3 metre pipes
- £1 for the 250 75-centimetre pipes

All the sponsor names were recorded on scroll which was hung in the organ loft for prosperity.

The woodwork for the church organ dates back to Canon Lester the Rector of St Leonard's at the time. He was a skilled wood carver and also taught some of the young boys in the parish to carve so they could assist in the work. The Organ case and screen were a gift from the Sanders family and a plaque commemorating this is displayed above the console. Finally, the skill of Canon Lester was demonstrated when he carved and built the Altar which we still use to this day.

In addition to sponsoring of the pipes, many fund raising activities were held under the guidance of David Cawdell (a member of the PCC) to raise money for the 1991 work.

At the time of it's restoration in 1991 the organ was valued at £150,000; one dreads to think how much it would cost to restore the organ in today's economic climate and what would its value be? This is why we have it regularly serviced.

Have You been Bereaved?

Losing a loved one can leave you feeling adrift; talking and meeting with others in a similar situation may help.

Lexden Bereavement Support Group offers the opportunity to chat over a cup of tea. The group is informal and relaxed, and led by trained volunteers.

It is open to people of all faiths and backgrounds and is usually run on Thursday afternoons fortnightly.


