### Hearing God in Lent -Hearing God in Poetry

Lent is the season when we try to strip back some of the distractions of our lives so that we might be freer to listen to God. Each Lent, St Leonard's runs a course to assist us in this task. This year, our course is called "Hearing God in Poetry".

Whether or not you enjoy written poetry, we're all exposed to it in songs and rhymes – and even adverts. We know poetry through our services, our prayers and the Bible too.

Roughly a third of the Bible was written as poetry or song. This can sometimes be forgotten as translations don't always make it easy to pick up on the 'music' that these poems had in their original tongues.

In the great canticles (a word that means 'songs') like the Benedictus, the Magnificat and the Nunc Dimittis in Luke's Gospel, we have been gifted carefully crafted and beautiful expressions of the truth of God and the hope of Christian life:

In the tender compassion of our God the dawn from on high shall break upon us, to shine on those who dwell in the darkness and the shadow of death,

and to guide our feet into the way of peace.

The Psalms (a word that means, 'hymns', which means 'songs'!) consist entirely of poetry. They explore the depths and troubles of human experience with a devastating realism — just as they portray praise, joy, hope and even boredom with incredible colour and authenticity. In the days when I used to teach composition and songwriting, some students suspected I was joking when I said that those who thought gritty songwriting started with Johnny Cash or Woody Guthrie, or that emotion in song came first from Monteverdi and Purcell, should get to know the Psalms. I remain unshaken in my belief that the Book of Psalms is the greatest collection of songs ever compiled!

For those who do like written poetry, some of the greatest poets in our language were Anglican priests: John Donne, George Herbert, and the Wesleys to name but three. These and many other Christian poets have shaped our world with their poems' ability to share their faith – people like John of the Cross, Christina Rosetti and Gerard Manley Hopkins.

Many books have attempted to explain exactly what a poem is. For me, (often) a poem uses heightened and/or carefully selected language put together with intention, a sense of rhythm or broken rhythm, and (usually)some sense a sense of discernment and economy.

The best poets can sometimes spend years putting something together and then end up with just 6 lines of text. This is Lenten work! This way of cherishing expression and language – and shaping it with love and intention - is why one Christian writer has suggested that 'poems are prayers.'

Our local papers are full of poems people have written, or selected, in order to honour somebody after their death. When something really important happens in our lives, we still often reach for poetry. But why so rarely the wonderful poetry of the Bible?

This process of carefully selecting and combining special words and cutting back the things that get in the way of their deepest meaning may be a really useful picture for how we might approach Lent.

Lent doesn't need to be a dour and boring time; clearing away distractions can leave room for the important things to be truly appreciated. The poetic rhythms and language of the church year – and especially Lent and Holy Week – draw us into a healthy prayer routine and encourage us to listen to God.

So, throughout our Lent course we will be using poetry to shape our reflections: some of it may be taken from the Bible, and some from beyond. Please Join us for "Hearing God in Poetry" on Wednesdays during Lent, beginning on 12th March at 7.00pm (or after the 10am morning Eucharist).

I thought it would be helpful to give you a bit of information about each of these charities, this month it's Next Chapter.



Next Chapter (formerly known as Colchester & Tendring Women's Refuge) is a domestic abuse charity working across the areas of Braintree,

Chelmsford, Colchester, Maldon, Tendring & Uttlesford. They provide free and confidential services to support people who are currently experiencing or have previously experienced domestic abuse.

As well as refuge accommodation for those fleeing domestic abuse, Next Chapter offers a range of services to support people in the community to help them stay safe, manage, and escape from domestic abuse and recover from their experiences to live the next chapter of their life free from domestic abuse.

They also provide support for children and young people affected by domestic abuse, including emotional support, parenting support, family work, group work and 1:1's. They provide training in schools for both staff and pupils to ensure staff can respond appropriately and effectively to children and young people who have experienced abuse and to access support available.

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#### A TRIBUTE TO BRIAN CROCKETT

Wendy has kindly given us permission to reproduce the tribute given at Brian's funeral.

In all the many beautiful cards and messages I have received since Brian died, the one common thread is his sense of humour. You could be sure of a witty quip for every occasion! He was a strong character, never swayed by popular opinion... or indeed, time! He did things his way.

He had a strong Christian faith. He loved his family, was kind, generous and non-judgemental. He loved classical music. He enjoyed rugby and cricket. He was also an animal lover and liked trips to the zoo.

He was very practical and had an incredible mind for maths and problem solving. Indeed, he put in an entire central heating system at 3, Oaklands Avenue with the help of a book, (no Mr Google in those days) having never done anything like that before.

Brian was full of 'sayings' and had one for every occasion, not always polite though, especially those learnt in the Army! He could learn easily by listening, and apparently annoyed school teachers and those at Eynsham Police College by never making notes. He always did well in exams, just by listening.

Brian was a pre-war child and lived in Ilford for much of the war. One day, his mother left him and his baby brother Martyn in the care of a neighbour, while she went shopping. Brian realised a V1 was approaching and called to the neighbour, who got under the kitchen table with Martyn, while Brian went into the cupboard under the stairs. He vividly remembered thinking,

'If I die, will it hurt?' but the bomb turned just beyond the house and flattened a barrage balloon base, killing all the workers, who were women.

For a brief period in 1944, his mother took him to Newcastle to stay with an aunt, where it was safer. Brian used to go up to the railway track, allegedly to watch the steam trains go past. However, he purposely got too close to the track, which annoyed the train drivers, who lobbed pieces of coal at him to try and make him move. Mission accomplished! He gathered up the coal and took it home to Aunty Dot for the fire!

Among Brian's wartime memories was one of his next-door neighbours coming home from Dunkirk bringing a box of chocolate liqueurs which they all shared. He walked to and from school with his tin hat, gas mask and a sealed box of barley sugar. There was often shrapnel falling all around, but he said he was never frightened.

He remembered walking home on VE day thinking, 'Well, that's finished now, what will we do next?!' He remembered a huge street party. He often asked his dad to go out and collect tail fins and bits of debris as war souvenirs.

In 1951 he served in the Army, in the Royal Corps of Signals as a radio mechanic, until 1954. He served in Kenya and refused to speak about any conflict situations but had fond and amusing memories of the native local village people. He had huge respect for their customs, traditions and way of life.

From 1959 to 1965 he served as a police officer all over Essex, including here in Colchester. He told stories of some interesting characters, including one chap who had relieved the local Post Office of its safe, and was pushing it up the High Street on Canvey Island, in a handcart!

In more recent years, Brian stayed home to bring up Richard and was a rarity then as the only Dad at the school gate. He was often invited in to help with various things such as Key Stage 2 Technology, making a huge

quantity of electrical circuit boards. He was then drafted in to cover some caretaking duties and loved being part of the school team. He often went to other schools as a 'supply caretaker' and two headteachers recently told me how much they could rely on Brian to get things done. He came for a while to Alderman Blaxill, where I worked. He spotted a flagpole near the front of the school. He was a real traditionalist and enquired of one headteacher if he might hoist the union flag daily. It became a real tradition, and apparently when he lowered it at night, from the headteacher's office often came the sound of the Last Post being sung!

Brian loved St Leonard's, and amongst other jobs, acted as a server and regularly wound the clock. He enjoyed our holidays, especially camping in France, and also trips to Malta, Gibraltar and Italy. I have Brian to thank for my successful career, as he always believed in me when I had no confidence, and he gently pushed me to achieve.

Thankyou's go to family, friends and neighbours for all their love and support, especially Richard and Frankie, Christine and Stuart who were there, day in and day out, and without whom I could not have coped. The wonderful angels from Home Instead: daily laughter from them and Brian coming from upstairs was heartwarming. He loved their visits and said it was like a big family. He looked forward to seeing them, and his schedule of who was coming was a treasured possession. Their support to me too was the best. Special thanks to Jodie, Jo, Sally, Lisa and Lisa.



God bless, Brian – Rest in peace.



#### Messy moments at the Baby and Toddler Group!

Being messy is one of the many joys of St Leonard's Baby and Toddler Group. We have a lovely big hall with an easy to clean floor, so we often indulge in messy play. The grown-ups like it too because some activities are just too messy to do at home.

Unfortunately, the children often end up pretty messy too! Activities with paint are obviously very popular. This term we introduced welly boot walking. This might not sound very messy, but the children stood in a tray of paint first. This was very satisfying, and no one was cross when the children overbalanced and sat in it!





The sand tray is always popular and this time we made dinosaur footprints in it. Amazingly our water play tray activities were mostly confined to the area directly around the tray. Probably the messiest so far this year has been shaving foam

play, obviously linked to our snow theme. This had the unplanned outcome of leaving the tray super clean, although I'm unsure it worked on the children!

Sometimes the grown-ups like to join in with the play and the play dough is pretty irresistible. When we were snowmen building with the dough the children found it very difficult to get a look in! This is one of the less messy



activities and we thought you might like to have a go yourselves at making some. It's a great thing to have in the cupboard if you have children visiting and it keeps for a long time in an airtight container.

Happy play dough play!

#### Playdough Recipe

1 cup salt
6 tsp cream of tartare
2 cups plain flour
Food colouring
2 cups water
2 tbsp oil
Blend together in a pan and bring gradually to a thickened dough. Then remove from heat and leave to cool.

Knead well.



### Messy Baptism!

Our Messy Church started in the new year with a baptismal theme. It was wonderful to see so many families turning up on a dismal wet and windy day. It was slightly wet inside but mostly all under control!

We found out about Jesus' own baptism and the amazing moment when God affirms His love for His Son. The children were fascinated when Matt baptised a rather hairy soft toy with the help of the children acting as parents and God parents. The water sprinkling went down particularly well!



The meaning of the symbolic elements and actions was carefully woven into the worship and were reinforced through the supporting activities. The children made beautiful baptismal candles set in a clay holder decorated with beads so that the children took the light of Jesus away with them. The paper dove had wings made from a map, showing our journey alongside Jesus. Total immersion was experienced by dunking marshmallows in melted chocolate and a jelly



If you are baptised, attend St Leonard's Church\*, and are aged sixteen or above, you are encouraged to enter your name on the new roll by completing and signing an application form.


If your name is on the existing roll you will still need to re-apply; this is a full revision.

Forms and a collecting box will be available in church from 23<sup>rd</sup> February. If you would like some help with obtaining, completing or returning your form, please contact Esther Heptonstall (electoralroll@stleonardslexden.org.uk), or ask one of our Church Wardens or a member of the Ministry or Pastoral Teams.

Please ensure that all forms are returned by **Sunday 20<sup>th</sup> April**.

You should be aware that information entered on your application form will be held on a computer database. It will be used only for the purposes of St Leonard's Church and will not be made available to outside organisations. We are required to display lists in church, which include names only.

\*If you are baptised and aged 16 or above, you are entitled to have your name on the roll if you either (a) live in the parish and are a member of Church of England or of a Church in communion with the Church of England, (b) live outside the parish but are such a member and have attended worship at St Leonard's regularly for six months, or (c) live outside the parish, are a member in good standing of a Church which subscribes to the doctrine of the Holy Trinity but which is not in communion with the Church of England, and are prepared to declare yourself a member of the Church of England having regularly attend public worship at St Leonard's for six months.



#### The Bishop of Chelmsford's Lent Appeal 2025

Supporting the Christian charity Housing Justice in their work across England and Wales to alleviate homelessness.

Housing Justice is a Christian charity that works in partnership with churches, community and faith groups across England and Wales to help provide those experiencing homelessness with a safe and stable home.

The work of Housing Justice is channelled through four main projects that aim to tackle homelessness in various ways at a grassroots level. These projects are:

#### Citadel

Citadel is a volunteer-led homelessness prevention project run by Housing Justice which supports people experiencing, or at risk of homelessness, to find and/or sustain their tenancies and establish a home. This project began in Wales in 2020 and was expanded in 2024 to include five areas in England including London.

#### **Refugee Hosting and Lodgings Programmes**

Housing Justice work with a pool of volunteer hosts in London and Wales who welcome vulnerable individuals into their homes. The Hosting project offers a lifeline to people seeking sanctuary and vulnerable migrants who have no safe housing options.

Housing Justice also operates a Lodgings Programme for newly granted refugees while they find a job and more permanent accommodation.

#### **Faith in Affordable Housing**

Housing Justice works with churches of all denominations to release surplus land and redundant buildings for the creation of new truly affordable housing.

#### **The Winter Night Shelter Network**

Housing Justice has helped over 1,000 churches to respond to homelessness in their local area by supporting them to set up and operate a winter night shelter for people who would otherwise be rough sleeping.

With an estimated 3,898 people sleeping rough each night in England and homelessness and rough sleeping on the rise, the work of faith and community projects like those run by Housing Justice are vital. Without this work, it's estimated the rough sleeper count would be 22% higher. Speaking about this year's Bishop's Lent Appeal, The Right Reverend Dr Guli Francis-Dehgani, The Bishop of Chelmsford said:

"The funds raised through the 2025 Bishop's Lent Appeal will help support the Christian charity Housing Justice and their work providing a community-driven and innovative response to homelessness and those in housing need. Their approach gives individuals the opportunity not only to find suitable accommodation, but to create a home and a sense of belonging. I'm pleased that through this year's Lent Appeal, we will contribute to the variety of projects run by Housing Justice, some of which are happening in areas of our Diocese."



#### From the Archives

#### How the Papillons became Lords of the Manor of Lexden

In last month's Magazine I attempted to explain how the Papillon family became the owners of Crowhurst Place in Sussex.

To understand how the Papillons became Lords of the Manor of Lexden we must go back to the early eighteenth century when Samual Rawston purchased the Manor from Isaac Selfe. Isacc Self had obtained the right to be called Lord of the Manor of Lexden when his wife, Penelope Lucus inherited the Manor from her father Charles Lucus who was also the 2<sup>nd</sup> Baron Shenfield. Sadly, Penelope predeceased Isaac which resulted in him selling the manor and all its lands etc to Samual Rawston.

The Rawston's, I believe, were involved in the textile industry, however more research is needed on this subject. Yet there is already a link to the Papillons which becomes important later in the story as Samual Rawston was married to a Sarah Papillon.

Samual was Lord of the Manor from the early eighteenth Century until his death in 1740. His wife Sarah would live a further twenty years, they had a son Thomas Rawston who was married twice. His first wife, Anne Fawler, died in 1746 which coincides with the birth of their second daughter Sarah Rawston. Sadly, it was quite common in those times for women to die as a result of childbirth, at this time I cannot confirm that Annes death was a result of Childbirth. It is also sad to say that the daughter Sarah dies young in 1761.

Thomas eldest daughter Anne was born in 1740 and would inherit the Manor upon the death of Thomas in 1769. Anne never marries and dies in 1816 at the age of 75/6. With no heir of her own the manor is bequeathed to her Godson the Revd John Rawston Papillon. Revd John Rawston Papillon was the brother of Thomas Papillon who had married Anne Cressett Pelham who by marriage had inherited Crowhurst Place.

The Revd John Rawston Papillon did not marry instead his sister Elizabeth Papillon moved to Lexden with him and ultimately upon his death became Lord of the Manor. The Revd John Rawston Papillon is an interesting character as it is widely reported that he knew Jane Austen. When he obtained the Manor, he did not become the Rector of St Leonards or take up the living. It is during this period that George Preston is made Rector. It is during George Preston's Rectorship that the present St Leonards was constructed.

When Elizabeth Papillon inherited the manor, she was able to appoint a new rector following the death of George Preston she kept it in the family and appointed her brother Thomas's second son, her nephew, as the new Rector. As I said in last month's archive the Papillons quite often used the same names for their children the nephews name was John Papillon. He would be Rector for almost fifty years and his memorial is displayed in the church.

On the graves of both Anne Rawston and Elizabeth Papillon they are classed as Mrs. This is not unusual during these times as most married women were classed as Mistress. Mrs therefore was often used to denote an older woman in the same way the term Miss was reserved for unmarried young women or girls.


